## **Operation Black Vote Canada and university partners announce first comprehensive study of Black Canadians' participation and inclusion in elected office**

(Toronto, ON- October 3, 2022) More than 1.2 million Black Canadians call Canada home. Many have achieved great success in business, law, education, and other fields. Even so, just 19 Black Canadians have ever been elected to Parliament. There have been no Black provincial premiers, and only a handful of mayors.

Why aren't there more Black Canadians in elected office? A new partnership will find out through the first comprehensive study of Black Canadians' participation and inclusion in elected office.

Funded by the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council's Partnership Engage Program and led by co-directors Velma Morgan and Erin Tolley, the project brings together Operation Black Vote Canada with researchers from Carleton University, McGill University, and the University of Toronto.

Working collaboratively, the team will identify Black Canadians who have run for and served in elected office at the school board, municipal, provincial, and federal levels over the past 20 years and then talk to them about running for and serving in elected office in Canada. The project will provide a necessary examination of the Black Canadian experience in politics, pinpointing barriers and making recommendations about how to increase representation in elected office. A key outcome will be the development of resources and training tools aimed at Black Canadian candidates and office-holders.

"It is imperative that we have data on Black civic engagement and the barriers faced by Black Canadians at all levels of our government. This will allow us to provide better supports for Black Canadians in their pursuit of elected office." –Velma Morgan, chair of Operation Black Vote Canada

"To date, researchers have devoted too little attention to the experiences of Black Canadians in electoral politics.
